Their thoughtful and comprehensive responses were well received, significantly advancing our petition for a full Charter.

Sunday brought the ever-popular Street Parade, with floats, patrols, and vehicles of all varieties taking to the streets of downtown Atlanta. Thanks to Noble George Huth and members of his Mother Temple, Abou Ben Adhem, Nobles Nick and Terry enjoyed VIP access and a "feztastic" experience being transported through the streets lined with thousands of onlookers and well-wishers. On Monday morning, 30th June, during the general session, it was officially announced that Acrux Shriners had been granted a full Charter. The presentation ceremony followed soon after—a proud and historic moment for our Temple. A standing ovation from the 1,500 to 2,000 Nobles in attendance celebrated this milestone and reflected the unity and fellowship that define Shriners International.

Congratulations to you all. Now, the real work begins!







Our Foundation Potentate marks the occasion

The Shriners Potentate's Lapel Pin: A Symbol of Leadership and Fellowship.

The Shriners Potentate's lapel pin is a distinctive emblem crafted annually by each Potentate—the elected leader of a local Shrine temple (chapter). These pins are given as tokens of appreciation to fellow Nobles (members), visitors, and dignitaries during the Potentate's year in office. Typically customised with the Potentate's name, year, and unique design elements, the pin serves as both a keepsake and a symbol of the shared values and camaraderie within the Shriners fraternity.

The tradition of creating and exchanging lapel pins dates back to the early 20th century, evolving from simple recognition badges into collectible pieces of memorabilia. As the Shriners organisation grew, so did the popularity of these pins, eventually becoming a hallmark of each Potentate's term. Over time, designs have become more elaborate and meaningful, often incorporating local landmarks, personal mottos, or themes reflecting the Potentate's vision.

More than just decorative items, Potentate pins foster a sense of unity, pride, and historical continuity among members. They commemorate leadership, celebrate service, and promote fellowship, all central tenets of the Shriners' mission to support each other and the communities they serve—especially through their renowned philanthropic work helping children in need.

This year, Illustrious Potentate, Illustrious Sir Terry Webster, has produced the first ever pin for the Acrux Temple, with the message "Helping Kids Thrive in 25". Noble Jonathan (Jonno) Evans designed the pin, which has Popeye the Sailor Man depicted wearing a fez. Noble Terry was a ships Master, having served 47 years at sea. Jonno's design reflects the Potentate's background and his message.

History of the Foundation of Shriners in Australia

Back in 2009, a small group of Masons, who, knowing of "Shriners" and having been to the USA to witness what they did, decided to do the Australian thing and "give it a go".

So began our Shriner journey. First, we needed to get the word out about Shriners and educate the Masons here as many had no idea what a Shriner was. The two Masons who got this started were Ross Jackson & Adam Murphy from Sydney.

After finding out what was required by Shriners International, we began the process of establishing a club in Sydney. The main requirement was to obtain written permission from the Craft Grand Master to allow us to form a Club in his jurisdiction. We approached the then Grand Master, MWBro. Greg Levenston MD, who gladly supplied the letter. Once received, the next step was to get the candidate numbers required for the then Potentate from AAHMES (the authorised sponsoring Shrine Temple in Livermore USA), Ill. Sir. Terry Moody, to come to Sydney, dedicate the club and perform the first Fezzing in Australia. The requirement for 45 masons was met and the ceremony was held at the Belgium Beer Café in the Rocks district of Sydney with Noble Ross Jackson being appointed the first President of the Sydney Shrine Club.

About 12 to 18 months later Noble Ross Jackson, who was also a member of the Masonic Motorcycle Association of Australia (MMAA), attended an AGM meeting in Narrandera NSW. While chatting with a number of members from interstate clubs, the Victorian Chapter President of the MMAA, WBro. Terry Webster, asked me about the various Masonic tattoos I had, and one in particular that stood out. It was the Shrine tattoo which Terry had not seen before and did not know of its origin. After explaining who the Shriners were and what they did for the care and welfare of children, he took on the idea of doing the same in Melbourne, and so the Melbourne Shrine club had its origin.

So, to look back on what was an idea about helping kids we now have our own Temple. The task was made easier when Shriners International realised that building membership to 300 in one club would be rather difficult, so the decision to have a total of 300 spread across the country was adopted.

Australia has jumped aboard with two standout Taprooms already raising their mugs high: Brisbane's Taproom #59 and Melbourne's Taproom #48.

Shriners Taprooms are officially recognised clubs within Shriners International, formed under the banner of the International Association of Shrine Taprooms (IAST). These clubs promote fellowship through the appreciation and sometimes crafting of beer, wine, cider, mead, and even non-alcoholic creations like sodas or kombucha. Whether you're a homebrewer, a collector of craft bottles, or just enjoy the occasional pour in good company, a Taproom is for you.

While the vibe is casual, the purpose is meaningful: Taprooms build community, support Shrine events, and—true to our mission—often raise funds for children's causes. They operate under Shrine governance and are expected to uphold the values of our fraternity, even when the toasts get loud.

To begin, submit a proposal to the Shrine Temple, detailing the name, theme, and activities of your Taproom. Upon approval, you'll receive a charter from the International Association of Shrine Taprooms (IAST), joining a global network. Each Taproom can develop its unique identity, focusing on inclusivity rather than just drinking. The IAST provides resources and connections, fostering inspiration and community among Taprooms worldwide.



Taproom #59 – Brisbane Shrine Club

Established in 2022, Taproom #59 was the first of its kind in the Southern Hemisphere and proudly waves its banner under the Brisbane Shrine Club. Known for its laid-back hospitality and pirate theme, Taproom #59 brings a hearty dose of humour and tradition to its gatherings. Members don Hawaiian shirts, pirate garb, and raise money by fining each other a gold doubloon for any number of high hearted infractions. Come and join the crew or ye be a scurvy bilge rat.



Taproom #48 - Melbourne Shrine Club

Hot on Brisbane's heels, Taproom #48 was launched under the Melbourne Shrine Club in 2024. While still early in its development, this Taproom is already carving out its own character. Melbourne's club offers a more refined but equally enthusiastic approach, with local craft brews and regional tastings on the menu. They recently held their 3rd meeting this year with two other planned. Meetings have been held in Clifton Hill and Cheltenham and the next one will be at Sunshine and a special Axe Throwing event at Abbotsford before the end of the year. They have raised nearly \$1000 for Easter Eggs for the Temple's donation and will participant in the toys for children later in the year.



As 2025 unfolds, the Brisbane Shrine Club continues to show what it means to be Nobles in action—united in service, fellowship, and fun.




Introducing our Chief Rabban Noble Les Dikes




Allow me to introduce myself to those who may not yet know me.

I was born in England in 1943 and relocated to Kenya shortly after WWII, following my father's Army regiment's deployment to East Africa.



There was champagne, cocktails, pots of tea, coffee, and enough high tea treats—cakes, scones, croissants, and finger foods—to make

Acrux Shriners Temple Jewel Award System is here!

A simple way to say: we see you, and we appreciate you

Let's be honest — a lot of the work that keeps our Shrine Clubs going isn't flashy. It's the Nobles who show up early, stay late, help carry the tables, bring a mate into the Shrine, or just quietly keep things running in the background. These are the guys who rarely ask for thanks but absolutely deserve it.

That's what the Acrux Temple Jewel Point System is all about. It's a way of recognising effort — real, practical, boots-on-the-ground involvement. You don't need a title. You don't need a spotlight. You just need to be someone who pitches in and sticks around.

Here's how it works: every time you take part in something Shrine-related — a parade, a ceremony, a fundraiser, helping out a new Noble — you earn points. Over time, those points add up. When you hit 1500, you'll receive the Jewel of Acrux. It's not a giveaway. It's not a participation trophy. It's something you earn, over time, by being there when it counts.

Keep going and the same Jewel can be upgraded. At 3000 points, it gets a silver star. At 5000, a gold one. That's it — one Jewel, three levels, all built on steady involvement and quiet commitment.

A quick note on bringing in new Nobles — you don't get points just for writing your name on a petition. It's about actually helping a Master Mason make the journey into the Shrine. Guiding them. Checking in. Getting them to events. You can earn points for that up to four times a year, but only if you've genuinely been involved. And no, being President or Secretary doesn't mean you get the points automatically. Everyone's held to the same standard.

One other important thing: you have to be financial. If you haven't paid your Temple dues for the current year, you're not eligible to earn points. That's not a punishment — it's just part of showing you're on board.

Each Club can also hand out its own smaller awards as you go — patches, pins, coins, and the occasional funny one like the "Ancient Order of Camel Herders" medal. Those little milestone awards aren't about ego — they're about momentum. A pat on the back now and then keeps people motivated.

Everything gets tracked in WebFez. Club Secretaries are in charge of setting up events and scanning people in, so we've got a fair record of what's been done and who was there. And while the system starts from now, Secretaries can submit points for past events, so no one misses out on credit where it's due.

Not sure where you stand? Ask your Secretary. You might be closer than you think.




